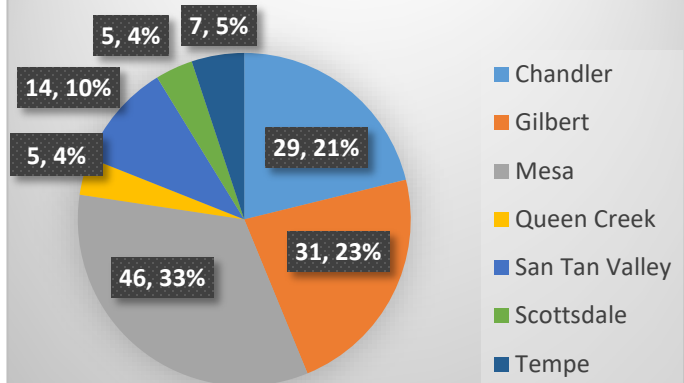

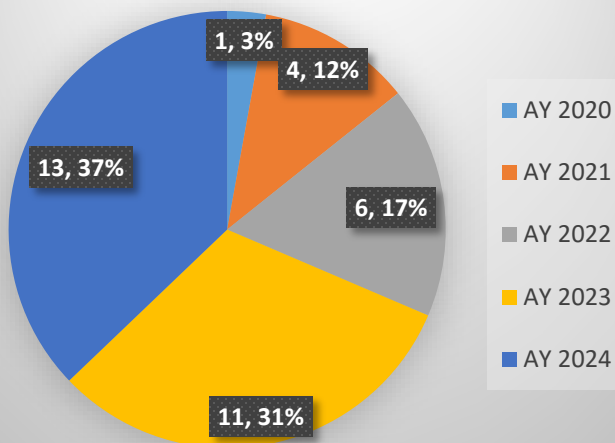

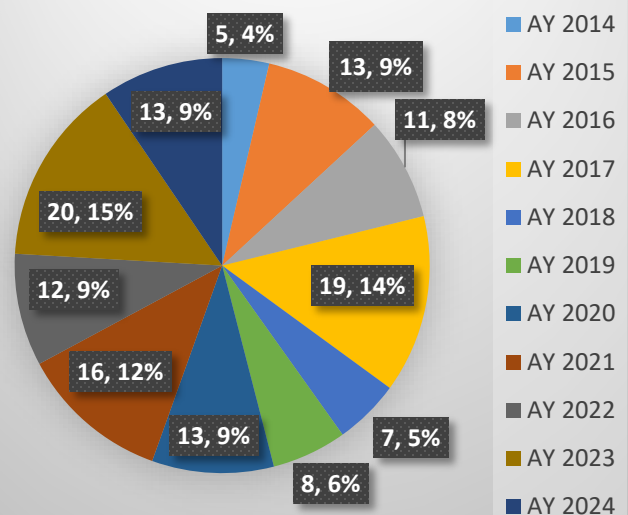


Began w/Positive Paths



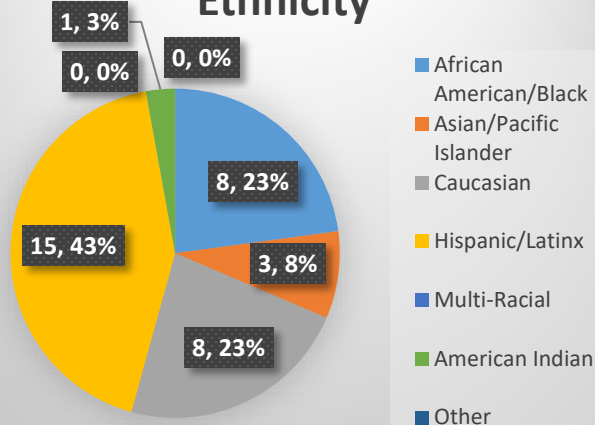

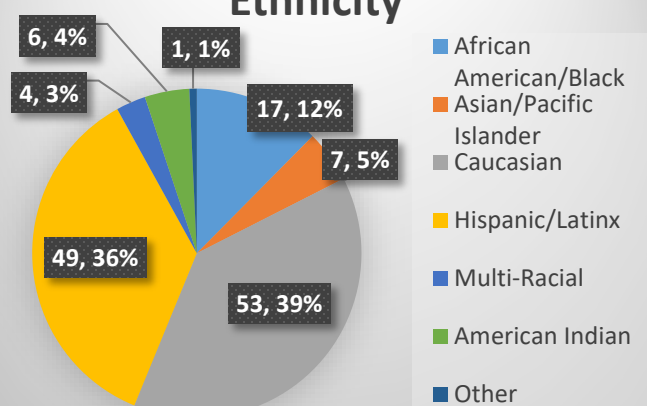

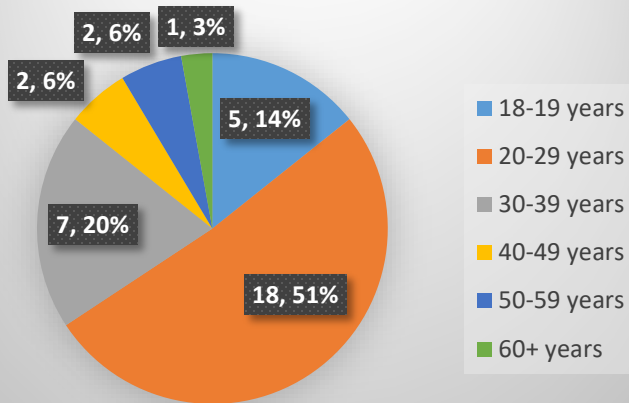

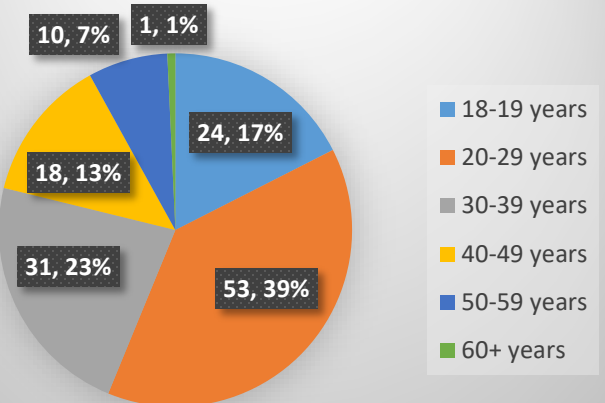

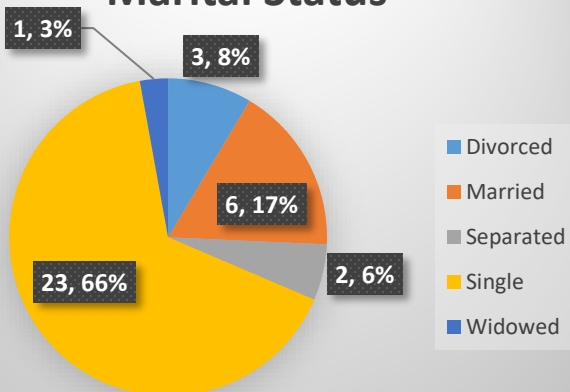

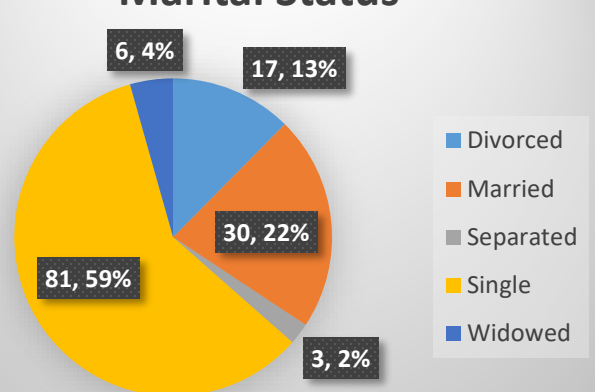
Age at Time of Entry



Marital Status

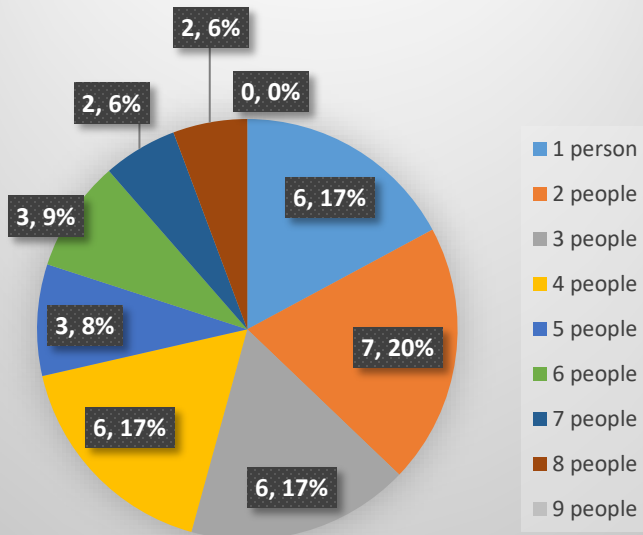

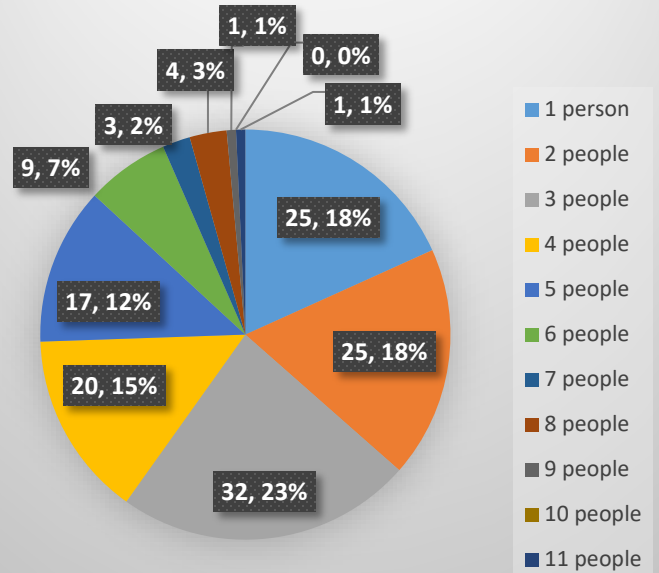

Numer of People in Family

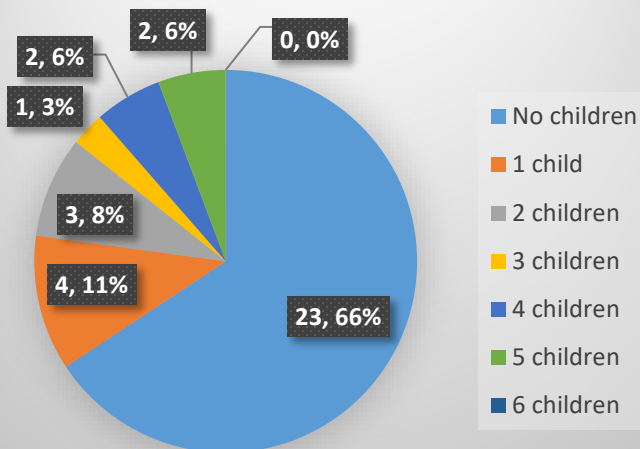

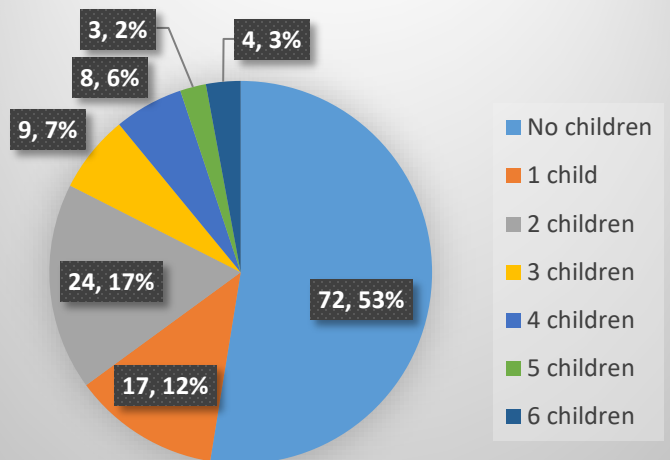

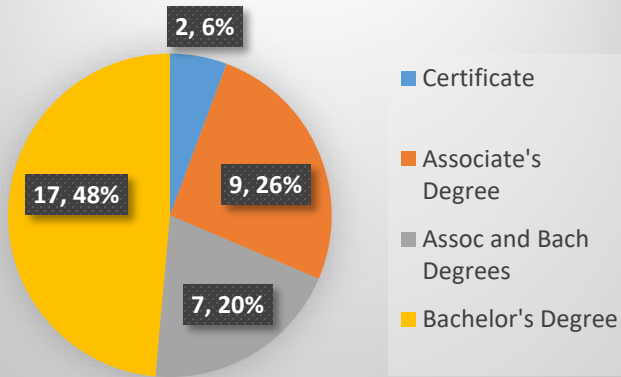

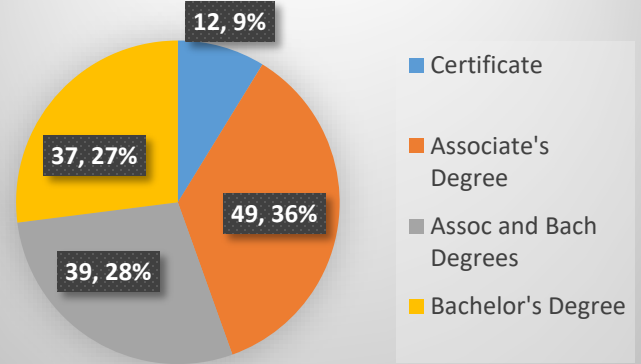

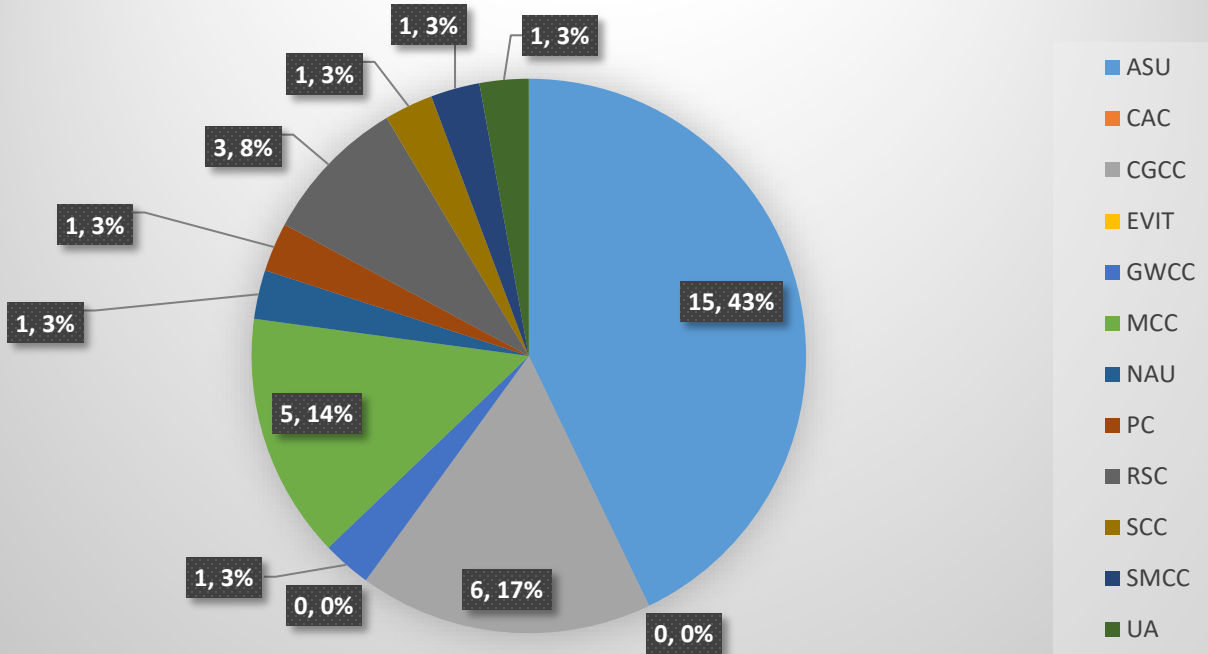

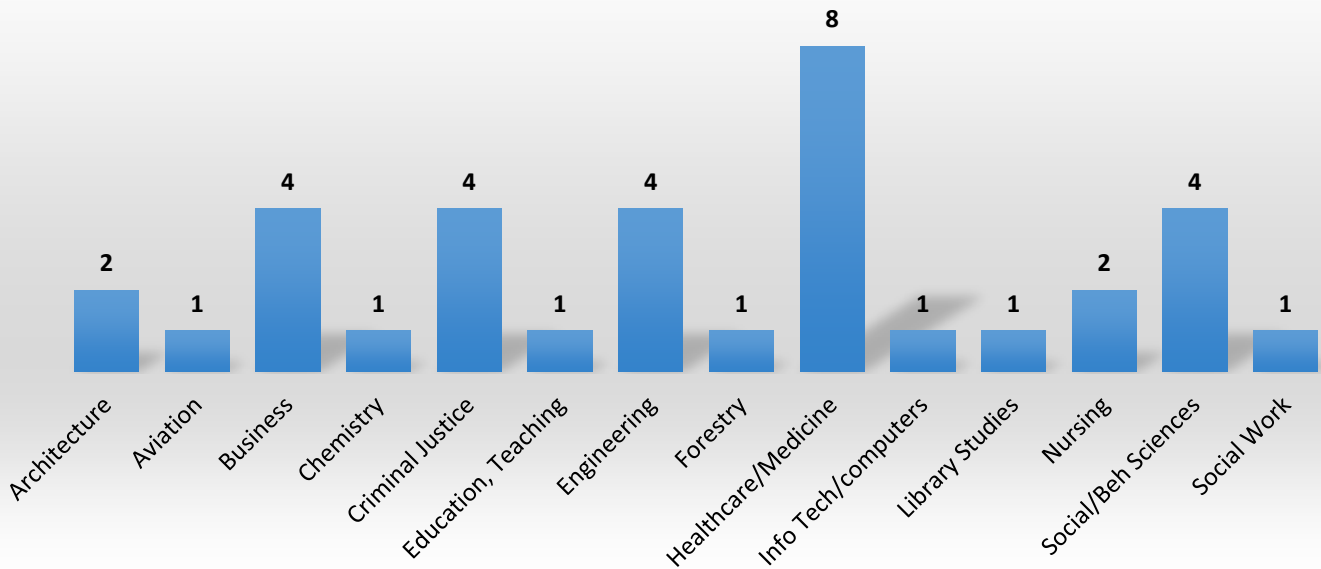


School Enrollment for 2024

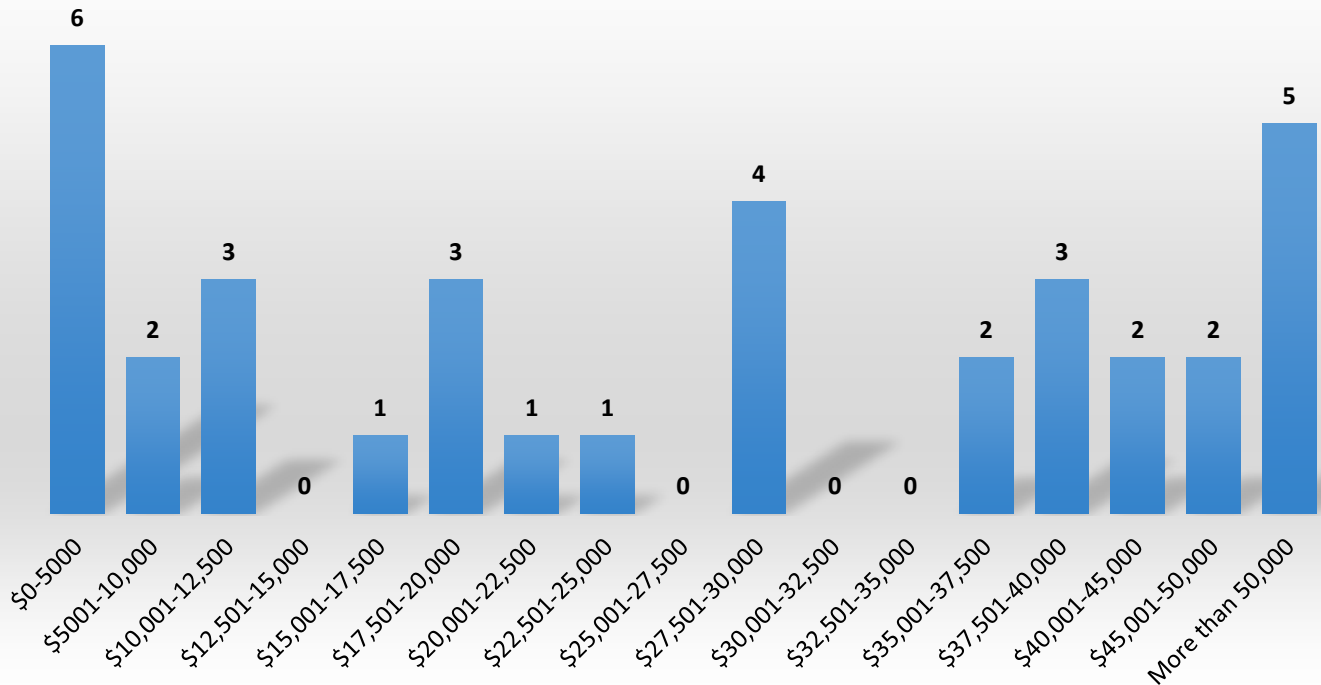

Other information (Fall 2024, 35 women)

- 14 (40%) have experienced poverty
- 10 (29%) are caring for a loved one, other than their children
- 6 (17%) have experienced violence
- 19 (54%) are the first-generation of their family to attend college
- 4 (11%) have experienced homelessness
- 3 (9%) have physical health challenges
- 9 (26%) have mental health challenges
- 1 (3%) have had substance abuse issues
- 6 (17%) are immigrants and/or refugees

Other information (All Scholars 2014-2024, 137 women)

- 54 (39%) have experienced poverty
- 37 (27%) are caring for a loved one, other than their children
- 27 (20%) have experienced violence
- 45 (33%) are the first-generation of their family to attend college
- 23 (17%) have experienced homelessness
- 4 (3%) have physical health challenges
- 16 (12%) have mental health challenges
- 9 (7%) have had substance abuse issues
- 14 (10%) are immigrants and/or refugees

76 of the 102 of the women who have been in the program have graduated with their degrees (75%).

To put this in perspective, for 2020, the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) reports that at public 4-year institutions 63% of students completed a bachelor's degree within 6 years. Among first-time, full-time undergraduate students who began seeking a certificate or associate's degree at a public 2-year institution, 34% attained their credential within 4 years. For at-risk students, the percentage of completers varies by institution, but the national averages are far below the 63% and 34% marks.

Thus, 75% completion with at-risk individuals is outstanding. We attribute this to the extraordinary effort of our scholars, coupled with financial support and great mentoring.
