

# Other information (Fall 2025, 38 women)

- 16 (42%) have experienced poverty
- 11 (29%) are caring for a loved one, other than their children
- 5 (13%) have experienced violence
- 19 (50%) are the first-generation of their family to attend college
- 5 (13%) have experienced homelessness
- 4 (11%) have physical health challenges
- 8 (21%) have mental health challenges
- 6 (17%) are immigrants and/or refugees
- 1 (3%) has aged out of foster care
- 12 (32%) are bilingual

# Other information (All Scholars 2014-2025, 151 women)

- 61 (40%) have experienced poverty
- 44 (29%) are caring for a loved one, other than their children
- 28 (19%) have experienced violence
- 50 (33%) are the first-generation of their family to attend college
- 25 (17%) have experienced homelessness
- 5 (3%) have physical health challenges
- 17 (11%) have mental health challenges
- 15 (10%) are immigrants and/or refugees
- 2 (1%) have aged out of foster care
- 48 (32%) are bilingual

# **Successful Outcomes**

87 of the 113 of the women who have been in the program have graduated with their degrees (77%).

To put this in perspective, for 2020, the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) reports that at public 4-year institutions 63% of students completed a bachelor's degree within 6 years.

Among first-time, full-time undergraduate students who began seeking a certificate or associate's degree at a public 2-year institution, 34% attained their credential within 4 years.

For at-risk students, the percentage of completers varies by institution, but the national averages are far below the 63% and 34% marks.

Thus, 77% completion with at-risk individuals is outstanding. We attribute this to the extraordinary effort of our scholars, coupled with financial support and great mentoring.
